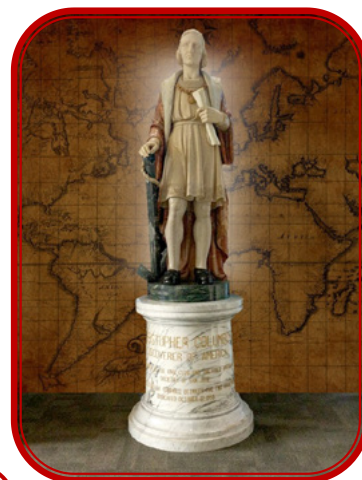

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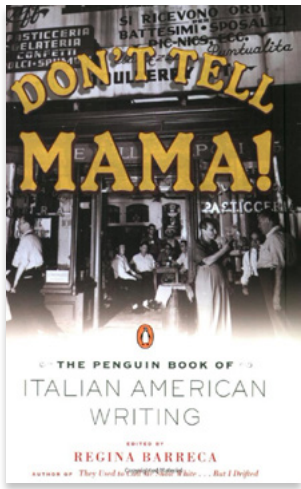

Who is Angeline Nanni??

A standard joke and observation around the house when I was growing up was the CIA could have won the Cold War much sooner if they hired my mother. I was always in awe and, of course, trepidation of my mother's ability to find all the information necessary to know exactly what was going on in our family, even when we tried to keep the information from her. Her secret network remains a mystery to this day. In essence, "Don't tell mama" was a failed mantra, she already knew!

It turns out I (we) were not too far wrong in this observation. From the Smithsonian Magazine (September 2018) comes the amazing story of a group of brilliant ladies who were known under the code name Venona. The author of their activities and the article of same name is Liza Mundy, and part of a collection of articles called Secrets of American History. The article is quite in depth and hard to do it justice in this summery, but suffice to note these ladies were an amazing group of code breakers, hired after the war by the CIA to tap into the secret messages and codes used by the Soviet Union in their espionage activities against the USA (what's new?).

Each one of the ladies possess fascinating stories in their own right. The last remaining code breaker alive is an Italian American, Angeline Nanni. Aside from their female gender, to a lady they were dynamic individuals in their own right, with keen senses of intellect. And of the group, Angeline possessed only a high school education, but she also possessed a fascination with numbers and sense of intuitive logic that earned her a place on the Venona Team. Not only is she a national treasure but also the pride of her Italian American family from rural Pennsylvania. The story is truly amazing, and because of the secrecy of their work their activities are little known until the material was recently declassified. With the advent of computerization, the Venona Team was gradually phased out, but their work and outcomes were vital to national security for many years in rooting out Russian spies in America. Chocolate... il Cioccolato

Since this remarkable flavor has been rather dominant over the past several weeks let's take a look at its California origin. The Italian community has the right to be proud.

Domenico Ghirardelli Sr. was born on February 21, 1817 in Rapallo, Italy, an historic pilgrimage site on the riviera in the metropolitan area of Genoa. His parents were Giuseppe Ghirardelli and Maddelena Ferretto. His father was a spice merchant in Genoa and he had Domenico apprenticed to a chocolate maker there.

When Domenico turned 20 he decided to leave Italy and seek his fortune in the New World. He and his wife, Elizabetta Corsini, moved to Uruguay to work in the coffee and chocolate business. One year later the couple moved to Lima, Peru, and opened a chocolate candy store. There Domenico forged a lasting friendship with James Lick, a famous name in California and specifically in our valley. Many of us have enjoyed treks up to the Lick Observatory atop Mt. Hamilton and some of us may have graduated from James Lick High School.

After ten years of being neighbors in Lima, Mr. Lick decided to move to San Francisco, bringing 600 pounds of Ghirardelli chocolate with him. It was well received, and, at the encouragement of Mr. Lick, Domenico moved to California.

Elizabetta had died and Domenico, who was now using the Spanish version of his name, Domingo, had remarried to Carmen

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Alvarado Martin with whom he had seven children. He left them behind in Lima as he sailed for California.

Caught in gold-rush fever, Domenico Ghirardelli headed for the mining camps, being one of the first to set up a tent store supplying miners with supplies and much-appreciated sweets.

Domenico embarked upon a variety of business ventures, some successful, some not. By 1852 he was making enough money to send for his big family; Ghirardelli and Co. was incorporated and has been in continuous operation since. By 1871 the company was importing a thousand pounds of cocoa seeds every year. In 1885, Ghirardelli and Co. imported 450,000 pounds of cocoa seeds!

A worker at the Ghirardelli factory discovered that by hanging a bag of ground cocoa beans in a warm room, the cocoa butter would drip away leaving a residue that could be ground. This is called the Broma Process and remains the most common method of production.

According to the Ghirardelli website, the company claims to be the only chocolate company in America to micro-manage every step of the chocolate making process.

In 1892 Domenico "Domingo" Ghirardelli retired as the company chairperson and was replaced by his sons. He returned to Rapallo where he died in 1894.

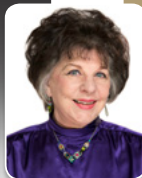

Book Corner



My Brilliant Friend

by Elena Ferrante



It is a special pleasure to review *My Brilliant Friend* by Elena Ferrante for you. I loved the book and am now enjoying the television version.

My Brilliant Friend is the first in a series dubbed the "Neapolitan Novels." The Italian title is "L'amica geniale."

It is the story of two girls who share a friendship which lasts their whole life. This first novel in the series occurs during the hard decade following World War II in a small town in the

outskirts of Naples. Keep in mind the region was bombed 110 times during the war, so it was quite seriously devastated terrain. People's livelihoods were destroyed; and the rebuilding was often competitive, unfriendly, unkind, and painfully slow. It was a revelation to me to be able to step back into this challenging time and experience it so realistically.

The girls become a constant in each other's lives from their first meeting in first grade. But don't think that the relationship was always harmonious. There is happiness, but there is struggle; their relationship reflects the society in which they come to maturity, not just the society of their little village, but of the whole of Naples, struggling to build and grow and prosper.

It is remarkable how the author can make simple events like checking books out of the library, or conversing with a smart boy, or receiving praise from a teacher be bright lights against a dark background. The book is so real. We see one girl, clearly a lively but caged bird, while the other is able to find her wings.

I did find it terribly sad to be confronted with this dismal society and rather miserable homelife the girls had to endure. Life in a desperately poor and tiny village full of frustrated adults is not lovely to look at. You can see the desire to succeed just wanting to burst out of these people. But how? The bullies (read mafia) are taking over and there are few options.

I confess that I tried to read the book in Italian but was not able to do so because of the extensive use of the Neapolitan vernacular. I am sure that the novel is an intensely rich experience for native speakers who are given the opportunity to become immersed in the famous Neapolitan subculture of their country. The English version is entirely satisfying. You'll find a copy in our IAHF library.

Two Italian brothers with a family history of baking have transferred their culinary skills from Sicily to San Jose.

The Palermo pair, Marco and Giacomo Montevago, has opened the appropriately named Italian Brothers Bakery on a corner of West San Carlos Street and Meridian Avenue in the city's evolving Midtown neighborhood.

Although the business is called a bakery, it's also a rosticceria and cafe, Marco says, serving panini, pizza and pastries all day and into the evening. Before embarking on this enterprise, Marco had worked for Toto Trattoria in Morgan Hill and Paesano's in San Jose's Little Italy.

The brothers' emphasis is on authenticity. That means the sheep's milk ricotta for the cannoli — one of Sicily's signature desserts — is imported from back home. So are the prosciutto, mortadella and other cured meats for the panini. And the roasted Italian beans for espresso and coffee drinks. Even the whipped cream (less sweet than the American version) is made in a machine they had shipped to California.



Family recipes are used for all of the desserts, from almond cookies to sfogliatelle pastries. Here, the cuccidati — Sicilian fig cookies normally found only at holiday time in the States — will be baked year-round, as Marco says they are in Sicily. Brother Giacomo makes 24 rotating flavors of gelato in-house. Customers can order by the scoop, in a milkshake or sandwiched into a

warm brioche bun.

Of the panini, the most popular has been the Italian Brothers combo, which layers salami, prosciutto, Calabrese soppressata, provolone, sun-dried tomatoes and spring lettuce mix onto ciabatta. Want an even bolder sandwich? The Siracusa includes Calabrese soppressata, gorgonzola, jalapeños, bell peppers and sun-dried tomatoes.
