The rest of the newspapers are now in his care and he has committed to digitizing them at a greatly reduced cost to meet a tight budget.

In addition, he has produced printed full-sized reproductions, which came out beautifully. He has donated two issues worth, and the IAHF may ask him to do the rest at some future time when budget allows.



La prima neve: una storia di due anime

A volte, quando si fugge da una tragedia, se ne confronta un'altra, e in queste condizioni, la speranza può essere elusiva. *La prima neve* racconta la storia di due persone apparentemente diverse e il forte legame che si forma inaspettatamente tra loro. Non importa quanto si tenti di evitarlo, gli effetti psicologici di una tragedia sono inevitabili, ed anche il tempo, purtroppo, fallisce nella sua missione e non ripara i danni. A volte però accade che due persone superino le barriere etniche e culturali che le separano e si identifichino l'uno con l'altro per poi, dopo aver perso una parte fondamentale del loro essere, riescano a ritrovare sé stessi.

Dani è un immigrato togolese che è fuggito dalla guerra in Libia, la cui moglie, Layla, era morta tragicamente durante il parto dopo aver affrontato il lungo e pericoloso viaggio attraverso il Mediterraneo. Dani vive in una casa di rifugiati vicino a Trento con la sua piccola bebè, Fatou. Questo paese rurale in cui si parla ancora il tedesco bavarese ed il dialetto locale, offre uno scenario mozzafiato ma contrastante che enfatizza l'alterità di Dani e degli altri rifugiati. Dani si sente scoraggiato e smarrito e in colpa con sé stesso per la morte di sua moglie che continua a rivedere nello sguardo della figlia. Per questa ragione lascia la figlia in mano ad una vicina, una sua compaesana, mentre lui arranca nella monotonia della vita quotidiana. In preda ai sensi di colpa e determinato a garantire a Fatou un buon futuro, Dani crede che la scelta migliore sia scappare da solo a Parigi. Questa convinzione dimostra che troppo spesso, per gli immigrati la ricerca di una vita migliore per la propria famiglia porta solo a più sofferenza e che il semplice atto di fuggire non sempre basta a curare le ferite psicologiche che la guerra infligge sull'animo umano.

Michele è un ragazzino di 11 anni che cerca di far fronte alla tragica scomparsa di suo padre, che anni prima era rimasto intrappolato sotto una frana. Marinare la scuola e giocare nei boschi con i suoi amici sembra al principio un rimedio efficace, ma si rivela solamente essere un passatempo che non aiuta a migliorare la situazione. Michele infatti soffre di incubi—dove si immagina il padre con una gamba amputata—e non riesce a relazionarsi con sua madre, Elisa. Per una famiglia, la perdita di una persona cara è, in un certo senso, un'*amputazione* nel senso sia metaforico che letterale: un individuo infatti percepisce questa mancanza improvvisa come una vera e propria amputazione dell'anima. La sofferenza di Michele e quella di Dani sono, sotto un certo aspetto, due facce della stessa medaglia —tutti e due sono *amputati*— ma le diverse circostanze in cui essi si trovano conferiscono al loro essere un'essenza aspra ed innegabilmente unica.

La prima neve: a tale of two souls

Sometimes, when you run from a tragedy, you find yourself confronted by another, and in such circumstances, hope can be elusive. *La prima neve* tells the story of two seemingly different people, and the strong bond which unexpectedly forms between them. No matter how hard we try to avoid them, the psychological effects of a tragedy are inevitable, and even time, unfortunately, instead of repairing these damages, fails in its mission. At times, however it happens that two people, surmount ethnic and cultural barriers that divide them and identify with one another, so that then, after the loss of a fundamental part of their beings, they are able to rediscover themselves.

Dani is a Togolese immigrant fleeing conflict in Libya whose wife, Layla, tragically died in childbirth following their perilous Mediterranean crossing. Dani lives in a refugee home near Trento with his infant daughter, Fatou. This rural and insular area in which Bavarian German and the Italian dialect are still spoken provides a breathtaking yet contrasted backdrop, which emphasizes Dani and the other refugees' otherness compared with the local villagers. Dani feels despondent and lost, blaming himself for the death of his wife, who he continues to see in the looks of his daughter. For this reason, he leaves his daughter under the care of a neighbor, a fellow refugee, while he trudges through the monotony of daily life. Possessed by this sense of guilt, as well as to guarantee Fatou a good future, Dani believes that the best choice is to run away to Paris on his own. This conviction demonstrates that all too often for immigrants, the search for a better life for one's family only leads to more suffering, and that the simple act of escaping is not always enough to heal the psychological wounds war inflicts on the human soul.

Michele is an 11-year-old boy struggling to cope with the tragic loss of his father, who years earlier was trapped under a landslide. Skipping school and playing in the forest with his friends initially seems like an effective remedy, but this turns out to be merely a pastime which does little to help his situation. Michele in fact suffers from nightmares—in which he sees his father with an amputated leg—and is unable to relate with his mother, Elisa. For a family, the loss of a loved one is, in a certain sense, an amputation, metaphorically but also literally. An individual perceives this sudden loss as a true amputation of the soul. Michele's and Dani's suffering are, in a certain aspect, two sides of the same coin —they are both amputees— but the differing circumstances in which they find themselves lend to each a bitter and undeniably unique essence.

Le loro vite finiscono per intrecciarsi grazie alla figura femminile del film, Elisa—la madre di Michele—che fa volontariato nella casa dei rifugiati, e di suo nonno Pietro, un falegname che dà lavoro a Dani. Il fatto che Elisa sia capace di aiutare i rifugiati nonostante le difficoltà familiari evidenzia lo spirito di sacrificio e carità che molte persone posseggono. Quando Michele e Dani cominciano a lavorare insieme nella bottega del nonno, nasce fra loro un legame speciale. Mentre passano il tempo raccogliendo legna fra le montagne e perdendosi in innumerabili conversazioni, Michele riscopre in Dani la figura paterna mancante, e Dani, grazie a Michele, guadagna una nuova prospettiva sia sul mondo che sulla vita.

Non è solo la neve che Dani vede per la prima volta. Seduto al fianco di Michele e la targa commemorativa di suo padre, circondato dallo splendore delle alpi italiane, Dani comprende che può fare pace con il suo tragico passato e trovare la felicità tanto cercata con sua figlia proprio nel luogo in cui si trova. *La prima neve* dimostra meravigliosamente come, in un mondo che può sembrare così colmo di differenze e di tristezza, il potere curativo della natura e l'empatia fra esseri umani, può colmare queste lacune aiutando le persone ad affrontare la vita ed andare avanti insieme. ★

Their lives interweave thanks to Michele's mother, who volunteers at the refugee home, and his grandfather, Pietro, a carpenter who gives work to Dani. The fact that Elisa is able to help at the refugee home despite her own family's struggles in a certain sense reflects the nature of the refugee crisis and speaks to the spirit of sacrifice and charity embodied by many. When Michele and Dani begin working alongside one another in the grandfather's shop, a special bond forms between them. While they pass the time together, collecting wood among the mountains and losing themselves in innumerable conversations, Michele finds in Dani the fatherly figure he had been missing. Likewise, Dani gains a new perspective on the world and on life thanks to Michele.

It is not just snow that Dani sees for the first time. Seated alongside Michele and his father's memorial plaque, surrounded by the natural splendor of the Italian Alps, Dani realizes that he can make peace with his tragic past and find happiness with his daughter right where they are. *La Prima Neve* artfully shows how, in a world that can seem so full of differences and sadness, the healing powers of nature and empathy can fill these gaps and help people face life and move forward together. ★



COLUMBUS DAY ALERT / September 23, 2018

As Chair of the California Italian-American Task Force I am requesting your action to help stop the Santa Barbara City Council from recognizing Indigenous People Day on Columbus Day. A proposal to declare the Second Monday in October (currently Columbus Day observed) as Indigenous Peoples Day is being submitted to the Santa Barbara City Council.

We need to act quickly and I have attached a link to the Santa Barbara City Council Members and Their Contact Information. The proposal is being backed by the Chumash Casino Tribe and the mayor of Santa Barbara, Cathy Murillo. These were the same people who sponsored the Bill in the State Legislature to replace Columbus Day as a State Holiday with Indigenous Peoples Day.

The Task Force took the lead in organizing the Italian community statewide and enlisted the Italian-American legislators to defeat that attempt to take away Columbus Day as a State Holiday. The stated intent of the action by the Chumash tribe is to pave the way for another attempt at taking out Columbus Day at the state Level.

Please inform the city council members that the Second Monday in October is also Italian-American Day as well as Columbus Day Observed and that this is an important holiday and celebration for Italian-Americans and that there are 1.8 million Italian-Americans in California.

In FACT , Santa Barbara has a history of Italian settlement and its own Little Italy with a number of Italian-American organizations and businesses active in the city. We need to let them know we oppose recognizing Indigenous Peoples

Day on the Second Monday in October, which is the day we celebrate our heritage in California and nationally. They also need to know that the state Legislature has declared October Italian-American Heritage Month and that Columbus Day is a State holiday observed on the second Monday in October.

We should encourage the City Council to choose a different date for Indigenous Peoples Day. We can point to the Sacramento Model where, after negotiations between the Native American and Italian-American communities, the Sacramento City Council has declared the Second Monday in October (Columbus day observed) as Italian-American Day and October 12 (Date of Discovery) as Indigenous Peoples Day.

The Sacramento Model shows respect for both communities and for both cultures and avoids conflict between the two cultural groups. The Campaign to establish the Sacramento Model was led by members of the Task Force. If you will send me a copy of any letters or email you send to the Santa Barbara City Council members it would be appreciated. I suggest you contact each city council member individually or you can do it collectively by using the contact email given for the Mayor and City Council on the list.

Cooking Class

NEWS



We traveled south to Calabria and Sicily for our September cooking class. This class featured pasta sauces which included Calabrian Red Pepper Paste sauce, Sicilian Anchovy sauce and Butter Sage sauce.

Ken Borelli began the class by reviewing all of the ingredients for the Red Pepper Paste sauce and discussing the red pepper paste. Pre-made red pepper paste can be purchased in jars or if you are the adventurous type, you can make it on your own. Whether you decide to buy the pre-made paste or make it yourself, the paste can be added to your pasta sauces and/or other recipes. Either way, it will turn up the heat in your food! During the class, Ken gave instructions in preparing the seasonings and adding them to pre-cooked pork along with tomato sauce. All of this was mixed into the cooked pasta. The result was a flavorful sauce and although I expected the sauce to be hotter, it was a mild, tasty sauce which was nothing less than scrumptious. By the reactions of our students, I could tell that they loved it, too!

After the Calabrian sauce, I taught how to make a Sicilian anchovy pasta sauce. (If you attended the Arbereshe regional lunch in May, you may remember that I made the same sauce for that event.) As in almost all of our classes, we put our students to work by having them cut the anchovy slices, the fennel leaves, the parsley and the garlic. Next, we sautéed the anchovies and the garlic, added the fennel leaves, the parsley, red pepper flakes, tomato sauce and other seasonings. Again, the sauce was added to the cooked pasta and was ready to "mangia".

Lastly, Ken demonstrated how to make a sage-butter sauce that the class also enjoyed. This is a great sauce to make when you're short on time, but don't let that fool you, it's big on flavor!

All in all, it was another culinary adventure where we had the chance to learn new recipes and enjoy each other's company.



But it was a delight to receive an unexpected gift from the prolific writer, Boze Leoni Hadleigh, author of 21 books! He sent us his newest title, *492 Great Things About Being Italian*, as a gift for our IAHF library. Of course, the title bears the

question... why not 1492 great things? He could easily have done that!! Boze, did you get lazy?

492 Great Things About Being Italian is a small book but packed with lovely information to please every person of Italian origin and every lover of Italian culture. Items are arranged in alphabetical order and include all aspects of Italian culture. The celebrity entries were interesting and somewhat surprising. I had no idea Steve Carell was Italian American. The art, literature, history, architecture, music, food and fashion entries will make all Italian-Americans beam with pride. For the most part, though, the entries are familiar. Interestingly, Mr. Hadleigh does wander into Latin territory including a few Latin terms that have become standard in English.

I do not deny, I would love to corner Mr. Hadleigh promoting the items I felt were sorely missed. I'm thinking there is going to be a sequel... *492 MORE Great things About Being Italian!*
